Midwestern Veterinary Student Shares His Journey into Veterinary Forensics

Gregory Gstrein, a class of 2018 veterinary student at Midwestern University, was part of the third group of students to rotate through the Forensic Investigations elective in the school's new Diagnostic Pathology Center. Cases are brought to the vet school by local law enforcement and the local humane society for necropsy and evidence collection in the hopes that the abuser will be found and prosecuted. Veterinary students are given the opportunity to be directly involved with cases and present their findings to law enforcement. Many students such as Gregory find this program rewarding and thought provoking as they see a side of veterinary medicine that is relatively new and growing rapidly. Animal Welfare Legislation Spotlight

Several new ballot measures are being worked on this winter as we gear up for the November 2018 elections. HSVMA is an official sponsor of a farm animal welfare measure in California and we, along with a coalition of other organizations, are hoping to gather 600,000 signatures to get this on the ballot in 2018. This new measure would let voters decide if California should expand the farm animal protection laws that were passed in 2008 (Proposition 2) and in 2010 (AB 1437). New language would increase protection for egg-laying chickens, pigs in gestation crates, and veal calves. The HSVMA is also endorsing a ballot measure in Arizona that would end trophy hunting of mountain lions and bobcats in that state. And in Ohio, HSVMA is endorsing a measure to implement stricter regulations of puppy mills.
